Emerging from Covid Anxiety, with a CHP Clinician Tag-Team

The isolation of Covid-19 was hard on Isabelle Conlon. An engineering student at Northeastern University in Boston, she headed home in the spring of 2020 as the pandemic set in, to live with her parents in Lenox. She was safe at home with family, but still, Covid tripped an anxiety wire for Isabelle: worry about getting sick, fear of infecting others, overwhelmed by the cascade of bad Covid news, warnings and deaths. The world felt out of control.

Isabelle began to overdose on aggressive exercise to feel better. Anything less than 10,000 steps per day was not enough. good Her appetite vanished. Over the months, she shed far too much weight. This wasn't a lifetime issue, it was new, and somehow sparked by Covid worry.

Then she had an annual physical at Berkshire Pediatrics in Pittsfield. At age 21, she was on the cusp of graduating from pediatric care, but not quite, and she'd been a longtime patient at the Pittsfield practice. But her clinician that day was new to her: Gina Nickels-Nelson, pediatric nurse practitioner.

"She didn't know me, but she took

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Donor Spotlight: Jack Polizzi Jack Polizzi of T.P. Saddle Blanket Pitches In for CHP



Years ago, the T.P. Saddleblanket shop in Great Barrington hired a young woman, an immigrant from Hong Kong, as a tailor and pattern maker. She was excellent at her job, but English was not her first language. When she needed dental care, she was unsure how to navigate local health care, so store owner Jack Polizzi stepped in to help. And that was Jack's introduction to Community Health Programs: witnessing how CHP treated and cared for his valued employee, a new immigrant with limited English language who needed good dental care.

"I tried to be an advocate for her, and so I took Jack Polizzi her to CHP Family Dental in Great Barrington," said Jack. "I was so pleased with how they cared for her, how they managed to get past language barriers, they were so gentle and caring with her."

Since then, Jack has referred others to CHP. And this year he was even more impressed in learning about the proactive work of CHP's Mobile Health Unit during the Covid crisis.

Covid testing and vaccination clinics around the Berkshires," he said.

This year, he wanted to help out CHP financially. So, like others in the business community who periodically direct sales proceeds to a local organization, Jack would do the same.

Each year, T.P. Saddleblanket has a warehouse sale to thin out its inventory, and Jack would direct a share of these proceeds to CHP.

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years of flat reimbursement rates MassHealth will increase its reimbursements for primary care, dental care, and behavioral health services. These substantial increases – about 50 percent over prior reimbursement rates, are long overdue and will vastly improve access to care, especially for lower income patients who often face barriers to equitable health services.

CHP will strive toward these goals by investing in staff and technology. We will strive to shorten patient wait times for appointments. We will continually evaluate how to best serve our most vulnerable patients, and all our patients across the income spectrum. As our patients' health improves, so does the health of our wider community.

These MassHealth changes arose through strong advocacy by the Massachusetts League of Community Health Centers, of which we are a part. Your support plays an important role in building a strong voice for CHP in this advocacy. I thank you.

one look at me and read me like a book," said Isabelle. "It was then that I realized I had a problem. I weighed 90 pounds, and I realized I had to fix this. She took care of me, and she's been here for me ever since."

Nickels-Nelson tended to the medical side of Isabelle's care and referred her to CHP nutritionist, Christina Garner. Christina and Isabelle kept as close as possible to a bi-weekly schedule.

Recently, Isabelle returned to Boston to begin an engineering internship. Her two CHP clinicians have kept connected with her via telemedicine, and are helping guide her back to better health, sensible eating and mental health support.

Her health is improving; her anxiety easing. She's reaching a healthy weight. She's found a good counselor through Northeastern University. She loves her job with a Boston start-up company.

Isabelle was a curious child who always liked to disassemble and reassemble things, figure out how things worked. She loved math and puzzles. So now she's in her element, balancing a busy job with her desire for healthier behavior. Christina Garner makes time for their appointments at odd hours when Isabelle is free from work. She's in regular touch with Gina Nickels-Nelson.

Isabelle says she now more fully appreciates the intricate connection between mental and physical health. And she's experienced the impact of dedicated "tag-teaming" clinicians, which is a hallmark of CHP's integrated, patientcentered care. And she herself knows even more about reassembling things, including herself.

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open to scores of shoppers who found great deals on clothing, including T.P. Saddleblanket's cowboy/ cowgirl western flair fashion and other, softer styles. The sale offered home décor and furnishings, textiles, fabric and more. It was a generous gesture.

Like other retailers, the Main Street retail store suffered badly with the Covid shut down. The Polizzi family's designer brand, Tasha Polizzi, was also brought to a standstill. Tasha Polizzi designs manufactures clothing for 600 U.S. retail outlets. With operations in Turkey, China and India, retail shops shut down everywhere and the business took a painful hit. Now, things are looking up as the area opens up and shopping is now back on Main Street.

T.P. Saddleblanket is celebrating its 31st year in business in downtown Great Barrington. Polizzi and his late wife Tasha were among the early arrivals who staked out a prime corner spot, at Main and Railroad streets, when Great Barrington was a sleepier town.

Today, Polizzi's older son, John and daughter-in-law Ashley, work full-time for Tasha Polizzi. Another son, Chris, and his wife, live in Tennessee, where Chris is a college football coach.


"We hope that by promoting our warehouse sale we may have picked up some extra customers," said Jack. "We hope to do this again.to support CHP."

Children's Programs Supported by You

CHP offers programming, led by our expert staff, who help to identify and address the non-medical issues that impact local children and families. All of these programs focus on children and their health and education, and are funded by your private donations and state funding. This includes a Care Coordination program at our pediatric practice which cares for children and families' social, behavioral, and mental health, helps connect them to services in the community (supported in part by Berkshire United Way). The ParentChild+ program is funded in part

The Coordinated Family and Community Engagement program, funded in part by the Massachusetts Department of Early Education and Care supports early childhood education and kindergarten readiness, and includes daily educational playgroups, parent education and support programs - offering programming at multiple sites throughout the County.

CHP also offers additional parent workshops to help support the positive social and emotional development of local children and families such as the Check Yourself Before You Wreck Yourself series, funded by the Jewish Women's Foundation of the Berkshires. Emergency food, fuel, and funds are provided to families in crisis via multiple avenues including Neighbor to Neighbor, Project Milk, and an Emergency Pandemic Relief Fund, all funded in part by the Berkshire Taconic Community Foundation and your donations. Additional programs and support are offered in response to community needs and recent events, such as the pandemic.

To continue this vitally important work CHP relies on the generous support of grants and donations, including gifts from the Green Foundation, the Crane Foundation, and a multitude of individual donors.

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The ParentChild+ program is part of a nationwide initiative begun in 1965 to prepare children for success in school.

The free program is a collaboration with Muddy Brook Elementary School in Great Barrington, and is open to Southern Berkshire County families with children 18 months to 3-1/2 years of age.

A trained community based early learning mentor visits the family home twice weekly, bringing a book or educational toy that families can keep. Our mentors share reading and playing skills with parents and caregivers to enhance child development and eventual success in school.
